#### WHO ARE YOU LOOKING FOR? AND WHAT ARE YOU SEEKING?



In the spring of 2020, I set out a vase full of palm branches in my driveway—the ones that should have been distributed and waved at St. Cat's, but instead, they were tucked into a box. The pandemic shut everything down, including our Hosannas. So out they went, along with a note on my Facebook neighborhood page, just letting people know they were there.

Much to my surprise, within a few hours, every last one of them was gone. I would watch as families would drive up and grab a few, dog walkers would stop and consider and then take a few more. Someone called out—"can I take one"? Yes! Yes, of course you can! If you have come looking for palm branches, you have come to the right place!!

It was such a small thing and I received it as gift—to watch this symbol of our Christian faith and hope go out into the world. How those palm branches might have offered transformation, comfort or joy, I will never know. All I know is that in that strange time, those branches stood, for me, as one small way to be church in this new world. If I hadn't been watching, I would have missed it, and yet, there it was before me—people looking for Jesus, looking for the church, seeking comfort and familiarity in the midst of the unknown.

I think about those palm branches, almost three years later, as we prepare to enter into the holy season of self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditation on God's holy Word. The shock of the pandemic may be over, but the trauma it leaves in its wake, and the unknown it cast onto the future—both of those remain strong. Lent is the time where we are invited to dive deeply into the complexity of what it means to be human. And, even more, we are called to look to God—God as protagonist of the stories of our faith; God as protagonist of our lives. Where is God in Scripture? Where is God in our lives? What is God looking for? What are we looking for? And where do they all meet?

As we enter a Holy Lent at St. Catherine's this year, we will be asking this simple and complicated question: who are you looking for? Using this as a theme for our Sunday preaching, we will seek Jesus in the wilderness, in the night, in our thirst, in our healing, in our life and in our death.

What are you looking for? Come and behold what God is showing us. Mother Sarah+

Did you know that we refresh the Holy Water in the baptismal font every week? It can be a powerful reminder of your own baptism.




#### Wade in the Water a class to learn about and prepare for baptism

Fridays | 12:00 PM



The project was started in 2007 when the Needlepoint Brigade enlisted the services of Sheilah Anne Oscher of Ft. Worth, TX, a nationally known ecclesiastical artist. Each kneeler was "adopted" to cover the costs. The project is now complete and it contains 11 stories from the Old Testament and 11 from the New Testament. They are arranged in order from the Creation story to the Resurrection.




# Did you know?

#### Special Liturgies during Lent and Easter

Part of the beauty of The Episcopal Church is that she offers us the opportunity to engage in and experience special liturgies during the season of Lent enhancing our rhythm of worship, providing us the opportunity to experience this penitential season in a different way, truly walking with Christ and deepening our faith.

**Ash Wednesday:** The first of the forty days of Lent, named for the custom of placing blessed ashes on the foreheads of worshipers at Ash Wednesday services. The ashes are a sign of penitence and a reminder of mortality, and may be imposed with the sign of the cross.

7:00 AM Holy Eucharist 12:00 PM Holy Eucharist 7:00 PM Holy Eucharist

**Triduum:** One continuous liturgy that starts on Maundy Thursday and concludes with Easter Sunday. This liturgy traces the final days of Jesus' life, his death, and his resurrection.

**Maundy Thursday:** This Thursday in Holy Week is the beginning of the Triduum, or three holy days before Easter. Maundy Thursday celebrations also commemorate the institution of the eucharist by Jesus "on the night he was betrayed."

6:00 PM Agape meal

7:00 PM Celebration of Holy Eucharist with foot washing

Good Friday: The Friday before Easter Day, on which the church commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus.

12:00 PM 7:00 PM

**Easter Vigil:** Historically, a service of prayerful watching that anticipated the baptisms that would come at first light and the Easter Eucharist. This often included the ancient tradition of storytelling to pass the time while awaiting the resurrection of Christ.

7:00 PM Baptism and Holy Eucharist

**Easter Sunday:** The Great Feast Day to Celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. At St. Catherine's this begins with the Vigil the night before and then is celebrated Easter Morning with beautiful music and pure Joy.

6:30 AM Sunrise Service 10:00 AM Choral Eucharist 11:00 AM Easter Egg Hunt
