

RECTOR'S REPORT

Historically, in these reports, I've spent my time looking back, reflecting on what has been and offering thanks for the many, many hands and hearts that make St. Catherine's the place of deep joy and gladness that it is. This year, I'm branching out, singing to the Lord, and the people of St. Cat's, a new song. This year, my report looks forward. But before I can look forward, I have to set the stage a little and take a quick look back. We're going somewhere, but you've got to understand how we've gotten here. I want to highlight three things that happened in 2023, so you can see what I'm imagining in 2024.





quickly came to the same conclusion: there was no room for an Associate Rector in the 2023 budget. And while I knew Trey would continue to grow into his priesthood and would continue to be a stellar priest, I also felt the absence of the role. So 2023 has been a year for me of reimagining and redefining my role as a priest and Rector of this place, as well as a year of reimagining the role of the Associate Rector.

In addition, we switched bookkeeping companies—from YPTC to SNS. And, mid-year, we switched Treasurers. Our beloved Chuck Zimmerman's plate was rich with good work, which made it hard for him to balance work, home and St. Cat's in this transition moment. He helped Tom Donoghue transition into the Treasurer position. We are grateful to them both. And it has meant changes in policies & procedures, relearning some things while reimagining others. Our staff, particularly Rachel Hutton and Pam Kulpa have been asked to step up in ways they didn't sign on for. I am grateful for their willingness to learn, experiment and grow. All to say: we are learning and growing into what it means, as a parish, to have our finance department outsourced. And while much is good, it's not been without growing pains.

Second: we revitalized our lay pastoral care ministry, using a multi-tiered approach called Caritas Connections. This was done with an eye not only for empowering the laity but also strengthening our pastoral care, church-wide, while also preparing for my sabbatical that will happen in just a few months. Weekly phone calls are being made to those St Cat's members on the prayer list and on the parish cycle of prayer; lay people are coordinating with clergy to make hospital visits; and we've even got a team ready for the unexpected things that pop up. Tom Hunter, Terri Gabrielson, Kristin Blackstock, Deacon Jess Speaker III and Joe Hegedus are the key people making sure this ministry runs smoothly and the church and I are deeply indebted to them. They work in partnership with the staff and with other pastoral care teams like the Stephen Minsters and Sonshine Meals to make sure the parish is deeply rooted in love and care for each other.

And third: after two decades of service to this church, the Drs. Williams retired to their lake home about two hours away from here. And we gathered a search team. When Chris Walters walked into the room, none of us fully expected what we got: a heart for music, Jesus, the church and her people. Our decision was swift and clear: God was calling Chris to be the Organist/Choirmaster in this place. There have been few times the Spirit has been so incredibly decisive. I am beyond grateful.

All of these things defined 2023 and have set a firm foundation for us as we move into 2024. In 2024, I anticipate continued growth—both in numbers and in spiritual health and vitality.

Here are the key areas I'm focusing on as we move forward:

Structures: One of the grand experiments I have conducted over the past few years has been around structures. We have experimented with ways of connecting ministries and Vestry. We've done this out of necessity—everything shifted in the pandemic and finding our footing has taken a moment. What's clear to me in 2024 is that we have returned strong. Our church services are full. We are welcoming in new members and welcoming back people we've missed. And there is a need for some of our old structures to resume their place. This year will see a return of a Vestry liaison for major ministry groups. Those will be assigned at Vestry Retreat and ministry team leads can anticipate meeting with your Vestry liaison within the month of February. In addition, we are bringing back quarterly ministry team meetings. These meetings are open to the entire parish, but are especially critical for ministry team leads, Vestry and staff to attend. These meetings last about an hour and a half and have time for looking at our ministries as a whole but also in teams. With our finance department being outsourced, it is especially important that ministry teams and Vestry members understand and have access to ministry budgets. This will happen at Quarterly MInistry Team meetings and with Vestry liaisons.

Ministry renewal: In the search process that called me here as Rector, one of the things I was most drawn to at St. Cat's was the depth of our ministry teams and leadership. There's no denying that we've taken a hit in that area since 2020. And yet, many areas of ministry are coming back, growing stronger, and other new ministries have been brought into our community. Consider this your formal invitation to find and work with at least one ministry team at St. Cat's. We need you. A couple of areas really need some attention. They include: Community Life and Fellowship—this covers everything from coffee hour to parish life events to who buys and cuts the sheet cakes. We are in need of restructuring, reimagining and reorganizing that ministry area. If you have passion, gift and skill in the art of hosting and hospitality, please connect with me or with Linda Scott. We'd love to bring back Greeters and work towards a robust newcomers team. If welcome is your gift, please connect with Pat Pepper. We really need acolytes at both services, but especially at the 11:00 am. Children, youth and adults are all welcome to serve as acolytes! If that sounds like something that would make your heart sing, please contact Joseph Hegedus. But mostly we need people to find and grow in a ministry area that brings them great joy. Ministry work brings us community, purpose and commitment. It's one of the essential ways we grow God's Kingdom. So I urge you, if you haven't yet, to find a ministry and explore the ways God is inviting you into the work of discipleship.

Sabbatical: In the Episcopal Church, full time clerics are expected to take a sabbatical leave of 3 months every 5-7 years. In June, I will have been ordained 19 years and I've never had one. And I've been here for 7 years. So…it's time. My sabbatical is coming soon: April 14th will be my last day with y'all before Mandy and I set off on adventures around the world. On that day we can anticipate a combined service, some ways to play together and lots of hugs. On the 15th I will set out and turn off my email and forward all texts and calls to Trey! As you may know, we received a Lilly Grant to help fund this sabbatical, so you will be invited to participate with me–enjoying weekly yoga classes and monthly cooking classes. I can already tell you: I will miss you. I know I will. And I will come home to you in August, refreshed and ready for the work ahead of us.

Staffing: We set three goals in the 2023 stewardship campaign, all designated to help us strengthen the whole of the parish. The goals were: to provide pay increases for staff who we felt were underpaid, making their pay more just; to bring a quarter-time children's minister onto the staff team; and to hire an Associate Rector. I am pleased to tell you that, thanks to your generosity, we have been able to do much of what we hoped for. For starters: we were able to increase staff pay for our underpaid staff.

The Associate Rector position and the children's minister position is a bit more complicated. But the long and the short of it is that we have, in fact, hired a new Associate. Would you like to meet them? I am delighted to introduce to you the Senior Associate Rector for Christian Education, Evangelism, and Stewardship, The Rev. Trey Phillips.

So I'm going to hand the mic over to Trey in a minute. But before I do I want to talk about what Trey's new position is, what he will be doing and what this means for our Youth Program. Trey will be stepping out of the role of Youth Minister and into the role of Associate Rector. To ensure the seamless continuation of our vibrant youth program, we are in the process of hiring a part-time Youth Coordinator who will take on some of the administrative and pastoral responsibilities of the Youth Program. As Associate Rector, all education and formation will fall under Trey's umbrella of care. This means his role will evolve more into oversight of the youth program, working closely with the part-time youth coordinator and the experienced slate of 16 adult volunteers who make our youth program so strong. As such, Trey and I can still be expected to be as involved and accessible to our youth as any clergyperson is. In the vein of restructuring and ministry renewal, this means we will continue to invest in the leadership of our youth and adult leaders to guide our healthy youth program.

We recognize the need for a part-time Family and Children's coordinator. This particular ministry of Christian education will also be under Trey's umbrella of care.. Trey plans to build up the Families with Young Children network and he will have more of a direct hand in that work in the initial phase of strengthening that ministry. We also recognize that given all he is going to take on, he may well need assistance beyond volunteers. We will be closely monitoring the work to see if we need to add more support during the year.

Those are some "in the weeds" parts of Trey's new job. The larger vision is this: Trey's role seeks to strengthen the vitality of our parish by nourishing three core Christian practices of education, evangelism, and stewardship. Ultimately, these practices are about spiritual growth—a vision rooted in the belief that a deep understanding of Christian teachings, coupled with a commitment to evangelism and responsible stewardship, forms the foundation for a thriving and transformative spiritual journey.

MOTHER SARAH'S SABBATICAL

In 2023, St. Catherine's received a grant to enable Mother Sarah to participate in the 2023 National Clergy Renewal Program. This grant money will be shared by both the church and Sarah for renewal activities. St. Catherine's is one of 177 congregations across the United States selected to participate in this competitive grant program, which is funded by Lilly Endowment Inc. and administered by Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. Established by the Endowment in 2000, the program's grants allow Christian congregations to support their pastors with the gift of extended time away from their ministerial duties and responsibilities. These grants are once-in-a-lifetime grants, so this is a big deal! (Some of you may remember that Father Jim also got a Lilly grant. While they are once-in-a-lifetime for the priest, they can be granted multiple times to parishes). This grant means that you, St. Cat's will be invited to journey with Mother Sarah, by sharing in some of the activities she and Mandy will be doing.

The theme of Mother Sarah's sabbatical is "embodying joy." She and Mandy will be traveling lots of places but there are two key areas of focus: the first is spending almost a month in a yoga training course. And the second is spending almost a month cooking with a professional chef. You will be invited to share in these experiences here at St. Cat's. All of these classes are offered to the people of St. Cat's free of charge.

ST. CAT'S OFFERINGS

During Sarah's sabbatical, we will offer a weekly adult yoga class in the Parish Hall. It will be led by Katie Ewaskiew. Katie is a teacher that Mother Sarah has classes with at Inspire East Cobb Fitness and Wellness. She'll be offering a Vinyasa Flow, a beginner level yoga class (although those with more experience are welcome to come and modify poses). Katie has worked with people of all ages and abilities. CURATE | YOUTH DIRECTOR

As a curate/priest, my theme for 2023 was "growing in leadership". That has meant taking up responsibilities in pastoral care and liturgy alongside my duties as youth director. St. Catherine's also fostered my mindset to serve and lead the wider church. This past year, I served as a teaching assistant at Emory University, studying and presenting alongside other faith leaders who wrestled with questions about the church's future. In addition, the publication of the Diocese of Atlanta's Pathways featured a profile on the impressive interfaith work of our youth program. Lastly, I was accepted into the Trinity Leadership Fellows program and now participate in online classes that empower my leadership at St. Catherine's.

As the youth director, I am delighted to share the exciting and impactful highlights from our youth ministry, showcasing the growth, leadership, and community engagement that defined the past year.



We welcomed several new youth faces.

A remarkable milestone was achieved as we welcomed over 25 new faces to various youth events last year. This increase in new visitors is a testament to the inviting and inclusive environment cultivated within our youth ministry through our Wednesday Night Live programming.

Our youth served on the Diocesan Youth Commission.

Our youth are active participants and emerging leaders within the broader church community. Emma Mabry, Elizabeth Singleton, and Luke Mikkelsen were selected to serve on the Diocesan Youth Commission—a commission tasked with planning and facilitating diocesan youth events—showcasing their commitment to shaping the future of our church.

Our youth were confirmed.

Several dedicated youths—Danielle Yucius, Bryce Pyburn, Harry Tear, Forrest Ettel, Julian Gardiner, and Lukas Deisen—completed an extensive year of confirmation training.

Several youths underwent the Rite-13 Ceremony.

Zoey Hutton, Patrick Clements, Tess Sauve, Jett Mikkelsen, Christina Pyburn, and Frannie Hitchins underwent the Rite-13 Ceremony, symbolizing their transition into adulthood within the church.

Our youths took an Urban Adventure Trip to Charleston, SC.

Ben Darke, Elizabeth Singleton, Anna Grace Ettel, Emma Mabry, Luke Mikkelsen, Kyleigh Paris, and Nathan Keisel, embarked on an enriching Urban Adventure Trip to Charleston, SC. The youth planned and led this experience, fostering opportunities for personal growth and exploration outside the familiar confines of their daily lives. We stayed at the historic St. Stephen's Episcopal Church.

We welcomed the new Rite-13 class into the Youth House.

We joyfully welcomed a large new class of 6th-7th graders into the youth house. This warm reception ensures that our ministry continues to be a place of acceptance, belonging, and spiritual growth for young individuals as they navigate their adolescent years.

We developed a new leadership program for our youth: St. Cat's LEAD Team.

The St. Cat's LEAD team is a new initiative to take the leadership training Father Trey is receiving as part of the Trinity Leadership Fellows, as well as the leadership skills present in this parish, and instill that into the next generation of youth. We are molding the next generation of church leaders through mentorship, skill-building activities, and hands-on experiences. This hand-selected group of youth helps guide our youth program by planning and coordinating youth activities such as service projects and multifaith initiatives.

Here is what Bryce Pyburn had to say about the program:

'Leadership and leadership through faith mean two very different things to me. I've always been a comfortable leader, but that mindset is different from the one presented to me through the LEAD program's training sessions. We've had conversations about conflict resolution and working through uncertainty, which were both powerful in addition to practical. Certain sentences have especially stuck with me, like 'the second you draw a line between yourself and others, Jesus is on the other side of it.' ... In short, leadership isn't just about intelligence, decisiveness, communication, and a will to win. It's also about understanding, self-awareness, service, and compassion. Understanding that has helped me develop as a person and a leader."

Our youth gathered with youth of other faiths.

In our commitment to fostering understanding and unity, our youth actively participated in multifaith events, including the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Celebration and several gatherings with our neighbors at Temple Kol Emeth.

We celebrated a successful Cinco De Mayo Fundraiser Event.

Under the leadership of Amy Mikkelsen and Joy Ettel, the youth program organized a highly successful Cinco De Mayo Fundraiser Event, raising an impressive \$14,000+. This financial support is a testament to the generosity and commitment of our parish, enabling our youth to experience life-transforming pilgrimages.

These highlights reflect the vibrancy of our youth, the support of this parish, and the dedication of our leaders and volunteers. None of this would be possible without the generous support of guardians and volunteers who gave their time, energy, and donations to ensure our program's success. Nor would these accomplishments have happened without the faithfulness of our 16 adult leaders. Thank you, Mel Paris, Susan Jenkins, Kelly Iacobelli, Fred Lopez, Dave Banko, Katja Michael, Thad Barrington, Caroline Brennan, Karen Kraeger, Wade Reck, Harry Tear, Deelee Freeman, Steve Pyburn, Jason Snape, and Jennifer Tear. Our youth program is driven by their passion, love, and humor.

Lastly, thanks to Patty Foglesong, Susan Jenkins, Katja Michael, and Steve Pyburn for guiding our youth committee.

Families require food: We had meals - we broke bread together.

- Sup with the Saints on All Saints and like the loaves & fishes of Jesus' time, we had abundant food for everyone!
- And of course, being ST. Catherine's, we had SHEETCAKE!!

Families need space to gather: Our church home has been improved and maintained, and is used constantly!

- Courtesy of the Great Christmas Flood of 2022 we have new flooring in the Admin Wing.
- Thanks to a project envisioned by a parishioner, funded via Great Oak Grant, and overseen by Bill Ivey we have a new space for storing the Clergy Vestments that keep them orderly and able to "breathe".
- Thanks to Bill Ivey's diligent watchfulness, non-stop monitoring, and experience dealing with things both routine and unexpected our facility continues to serve the many needs of our congregation and the community with nary a pause.
- We open our facilities to community use: ST. Catherine's hosts AA meetings, Toastmasters, Boy Scouts, Red Cross Blood drives, and Family Promise hosting.

Families have to manage their money:

- In 2023 St.Catherine's transitioned to a new (local) bookkeeping firm, Simpson Nonprofit Solutions (SNS); this saved a significant amount over our 2022 spend with a different firm.
- In 2023 we transitioned to a new treasurer, Tom Donoghue in a process so seamless you probably didn't know that it happened. We are extremely grateful to Chuck Zimmerman for his service in the treasurer role during the many changes of 2022 and into 2023.
- We completed the (Diocese required) financial audit for calendar year 2022, with a new audit firm and at a reduced rate.

Families support and encourage each other: We joined with other Cobb County faith communities

In November we participated in the 19th Ecumenical Thanksgiving - celebrating the tremendous gift of religious freedom (and freedom from religion) that is part of the founding of this country

In June we attended a community prayer service at East Cobb UMC titled "A Time of Prayer and Action" in support of the Jewish community following a demonstration at a neighborhood synagogue where protestors carried Nazi flags and other anti-Semitic symbols.

Families say "goodbye" and "hello" to friends and colleagues

In June we said goodbye to Dr's Brian and Jana Williams, who had given 20 years of good and faithful service to our music program.

And in August, after the search team diligently searched and prayed and interviewed and discerned - we joyfully called Dr. Chris Walters as our Director of Music. We welcomed Chris, and Carri, and Tarryn, and Shae. We thank them for their "Yes!"

Families take trips together: we went on Pilgrimage

• In October the All God's Children Ministry sponsored a pilgrimage to Selma, AL - open to all in the parish - where we continued our education and reflection on a history that can be difficult to look at honestly. We shared those experiences with the parish over breakfast last week.

Families welcome new members and mourn the passing of cherished beloved ones

- St. Catherine's family grew through new members walking through our doors, and new members being carried through our doors. We baptized, we received, and we celebrated confirmations.
- St. Catherine's family saw beloved members leave us for the life eternal. We mourned, we wept, we remembered, and we walk alongside those who are on a grief journey.

Families learn - about life and about each other

Christian Education (Formation) happens Sunday morning, Wednesday evening, in the parlor, in the Youth House and over Zoom - all ages are welcomed to learn more about Christian life, the Episcopal Church, and to share stories of impactful moments

The "Feisty Seniors" as our Bishop is fond of calling us -- decided it was time to form a "55+" group to enjoy activities & social occasions. Watch out world - we're not done yet!

In closing, I am grateful for each member of this family, and grateful to belong to it. I encourage each of us in 2024 to be aware of where we might engage with this family in a new and meaningful way. I encourage us to listen, share and grow – closer to God, closer to each other.

This has been completely intentional I have wanted to get to know you, musically! Perhaps you've even noticed some "deep tracks" in our chosen hymns, recently. Rest assured that I've made note of the ones sung robustly (and also the ones we may have, well, mumbled through together)! And, I look forward to continuing to try to expand St. Cat's hymn repertoire, and above all else, to ensure that our hymnody supports and proclaims our lectionary readings every Sunday.

We had our first organizational meeting a couple of weeks ago, and are now moving in the right direction to better our internal organization to welcome violinist Amadi Azikiwe (on February 4th at 3:00pm!) and the Amadeus String Ensemble later on in the spring. FACILITIES - BUILDINGS & GROUNDS

This little church on Holt Road is bigger than you might know:

We are stewards for the Diocese of 10 acres of land here! Our buildings were built in stages: the first was completed in 1967 and it's been added on to several times resulting in the campus we have today.

It comprises over 33,000 square-feet under roof! We have 28 HVAC systems to heat and cool us, 24 toilets, a commercial-sized kitchen, a preschool with over 100 students, and a memorial garden where some of the founders of this church rest, as well as many others we love and miss.



If you count the number of worship services, education classes, choir rehearsals and meetings that are held here every week ... the front doors of our church have been open and closed more than 15,000 times this year alone. So much so, we discovered that some of the bolts that hold the doors in place had to be replaced recently ... they were bent!

This past year began with recovering from 2 frozen pipes that burst & flooded parts of our administrative offices. Thanks to good insurance, we repaired not only the walls and the ceiling, we also replaced all of the flooring in that wing.

As with any year, there has been storm damage to repair, trees to take down, pipes to fix and a host of small and large projects in every nook and cranny.

We sponsored two workdays to spruce up our bushes and trim back years of overgrowth. Thanks to great volunteers for doing much of that work ... including a guy who just showed up one Sunday and said, "I have tools to use, what can I do to help?"

And another who calls a couple of times a month and says, "I'm coming down to church, tell me what needs to be done." You can read about a brilliant opportunity for service we hope to continue this year in the next article from Harriett Pyburn. We appreciate all who have helped this past year.

In the next few months you will see a new sign for St Catherine's that will be built on the hill next to the main entrance. This project will also be funded mostly by insurance as our 30-year-old sign out front was damaged by an errant driver on Holt Road last fall.

What makes this place so special is that St Cats is a living, breathing part of our community here in East Cobb ... and we thank God for all that we have been given by our forebears.

I recently read a reflection by Dr. Beth-Sarah Wright who worships with us when her husband comes to do his Bishop visits. She said, "What if we saw ourselves as 'holy partners' in a heavenly calling ... faithful to God's work and creation in us?" That's the way I see our work in this place ... faithful partner's in God's work here.

ADOPT A PLOT

HARRIETT PYBURN

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What is the mission/general purpose of your ministry

We want to steward the beautiful gardens of St. Catherine's in a way that brings joy to those who maintain them as well as those who walk past them. These grounds are just a small part of what makes us a welcoming and inviting church.

What is one thing you're really proud that your ministry has accomplished this year?



In 2023, we experimented with a new form of garden keeping. To complement our parish work days and our signup rotation which has been used for years to plan for lawn mowing (although let's be honest - Al Jones handles a huge amount of those weeks!), we started a program called Adopt-a-Plot with our gardens. We divided our green spaces into small, manageable chunks, gave them Biblical names and puppy dog personalities and offered them up for adoption for the 2023 growing season. For example, "Leah" (meaning weary or delicate), was described as "neglected and shy, but will blossom with patience and attention". We had both large and small areas of varying degrees of difficulty to adopt so everyone could find a good match (just like you would when rescuing a dog). Individuals, friend groups, couples and families signed up to "adopt" one area for the spring and summer. Our volunteer pool grew tremendously, and it was wonderful to hear the positive feedback from those who enjoyed spending time working in our beautiful space.

What are you optimistic about for 2024?

Based on the feedback we received in 2023, I think we will continue this approach in 2024. We hope we can expand to include additional areas that could use more attention such as the amazing rain garden next to the youth house.

Can you share a story of a time when you have you seen God at work or experienced God's presence in your ministry?

This approach demonstrated to us that many are ready to joyfully serve God in this place - sometimes we just need to find ways to draw our circle wider. While the task of keeping all of the gardens tended can be daunting if you are approaching it as one person, Adopt a Plot allowed many to pitch in in ways that they were comfortable and able - which reminds me of what church and community are all about.
